**Course catalog description:** "Communication is not something you add on to science; it is the essence of science" - Alan Alda. Accordingly, this course will focus on improving the skills necessary to communicate scientific concepts and scientific results to a variety of audiences including scientists in your discipline (50% of course), as well as the general public (~50% of course). Students will generate a portfolio of communication products throughout the semester as we discuss quality scientific writing (including papers, proposals), techniques for giving excellent talks, effective figures and visuals, writing blogs, generating short outreach videos, and using social media for science communication.

Pre-requisite: All enrolled students a research experiences to use as a topic for your communication portfolio products. Upper level undergraduates with research or internship experiences are welcome.

### **Learning Objectives**

After you have successfully completed this course, you should be able to do all of the following:

- Develop a short scientific research proposal
- Be aware of the key elements of a well-constructed scientific research paper
- Construct and deliver a convincing and engaging 12 min. scientific talk using Microsoft Power Point or Mac Keynote
- Recognize and develop a 'message box' for communicating a research topic
- Write & deliver an elevator pitch on your research
- Describe the main structure and role of tone in a constructive peer review of a proposal, article and talk
- Write an effective general audience press release on your research
- Be aware of and demonstrate best practices in radio and tv interviews on scientific concepts for general audiences
- Be aware of and illustrate non-traditional forms of science communication.
